My term as Chief Judge of the Nineteenth Judicial Circuit began on January 2, 2018. I am humbled to have been elected by my fellow circuit judges to serve as chief judge. Levitt, Presiding Judge of Misdemeanor/Traffic, Judge Valerie Ceckowski, Supervising Judge of Juvenile and Judge Christopher R. Stride, Supervising Judge of Specialty Courts. I'm look forward to working with my colleagues to continue to keep the 19th Circuit the strongest circuit in Illinois and to continue to serve the citizens of Lake County.

Construction of the Criminal Court Tower is anticipated to be completed before the end of the summer.
